Kibogora Hospital Sponsor-a-Bed Program

Kibogora Hospital is a ministry of the Free Methodist Church in Central Africa.



It is a rural general hospital with 260 beds, serving about 200,000 people in southwest Rwanda.





The maternity department performs many Caesarean sections. Due to the distance they need to travel or because of special needs, some women must come to the hospital several days prior to giving birth. In a recent year, 2381 babies were delivered. Of these, 69% were considered to be complicated.

The hospital offers both medical and spiritual care. Chaplains, such as Pastor Wakana, visit patients daily in the hospital and follow up after the patient returns home.



Twelve-year-old Sifa was admitted to the hospital with burns covering almost half of her body. She was malnourished, anemic and in very poor condition. She spent many months at the hospital, being stabilized and having skin grafts and surgery to deal with the effects of the burns. Her treatment required special, expensive dressings and a private room to protect her from infection. Her family could not afford to pay all of the costs associated with her treatments.
